




FESTIVAL HISTORY

The first Latvian Song Festival was celebrated 108 years ago in Riga, the capital of Latvia. This tradition has united the Latvian people for more than a century and is a proud heritage of culture that brings to Toronto more than 15,000 Latvians from all over the world to share their national pride with Canadians.

The 1981 Festival begins July 1st and continues on to July 5th. During this time the focus will be on participation - thousands of Latvians from all over the world will join together to express their unity through choir singing, folk dancing, concerts, exhibitions of arts and crafts, theatre and literary symposiums held throughout the City of Toronto.

The welcome is out to all Canadians from the Song Festival Committee and the Latvian National Federation in Canada to join and enjoy the exciting program of the 1981 Festival.

LATVIA and LATVIANS

Latvia is situated on the eastern coast of the Baltic sea opposite Sweden. Her borders are contiguous with Estonia to the north, Lithuania to the south and Soviet Russia to the east. It covers about 25,000 square miles, or roughly that of New Brunswick or Ireland.

Latvians belong to the Baltic branch of the Indo-European family and are distinct from the

Slavic and Germanic people.

Latvia, because of its strategic location has unfortunately been the battlefield for other peoples wars.

Consequently its population today, about 2,300,000 is smaller than before World War I.

Various parts of Latvia have been under foreign domination since the first incursions of the Teutonic knights in the 13th century. The Germans, Swedes, Poles and Russians have each held Latvian territory, and the social and religious differences within the country reflect those occupations. In 1918, the Latvians again took arms to overthrow their foreign masters, this time successfully; the nation declared itself a republic on November 18th of the same year.

During the second world war, the Soviets and the Germans occupied the country in turn, forcing the male population to serve in their armies. With the retreat of the Germans in 1944, the Soviet government gained control of the country and forced it under Soviet domination. Mock elections were held and a systematic campaign destroyed all those who resisted tyranny. The Soviet occupation of the republic continues to be deemed illegal by the governments of Canada, the United States, Great Britain, as well as other countries.

For all but those 150,000 Latvians who managed to flee before the borders were sealed in 1944, the 37 years of Soviet occupation have institutionalized cultural and social oppression. Through deportations and the increasing influx of Russians, Latvians now form less than 60% of the population and within the next decade they may become a minority within their own

country.

However, the freedom loving Latvians throughout the world still believe that their country one day will be free again from foreign domination.
