
Covid 19: were European libraries in lockdown?

Libraries and the 2030 Agenda

Four false myths

- SDG-oriented library projects
 - do not fall within the library's core mission,
 - are of an environmental nature,
 - concern mainly fiscal and legislative macro-policies and
 - fit small-scale, locally based projects of demonstrative nature.



SDGoriented library policies

Policies:

- LV: Institutional policy
- FR and DE: Bottom-up implementation policies
- ES: Strategy on 7 SDGs: 3, 4, 5, 8, 10, 11, 16
- NL and DK: Metropolitan strategy, respectively, in 4 and 6 cities
- EBLIDA: EU refocused programmes and policies and sources of funding to be found in Structural Funds



UVICINABLE GOALS

Think The Unthinkable

- October 2020: three European workshops
- January February 2021: National workshops in France, Italy, Netherlands, Greece and Latvia
- In 1992-1999: EU €1 / MCs € 1,000 = 0,001%
- EU investment in culture : €1 / MCs 140 = 0,7%
- Libraries get richer if they are «structurally» important in a country



WHY ESIF 2021-2027?

- EBLIDA selected ESIF 2021-2027 for the following reasons:
- a) the R&D requirement in ESIF projects is not essential; there is room for small as well as big libraries;
- b) programmes are administered at national level; no complex networks at European level;
- c) libraries, and in particular public libraries, are strongly connected with local communities, and so do ESI Funds;
- d) ESIF normally accounts for one third of the whole EU budget.






Libraries and ESIF 2021-2027: FAQ

- Which project for which targeted publics (in the SDG and ESIF perspectives);
- Who are the recipients of economic resources? (in France, ad hoc organisations);
- Total cost of the project and percentage to be required to ESIF 2021-2027.
- Who are the implementers?
- Partnerships and Task-sharing.
- Working methods (pilot projects?);
- Specific working methods;
- Timeline.
- Other elements.

- Member States build on the assets and resources available to regions
- address specific socio-economic challenges
- choices for investment
- a limited number of well-identified priorities.
- They adopt smart specialisation strategies

Targeted publics in an SDG and ESIF perspective

Library activities of social inclusion concern people residing in sensitive urban districts, rural areas or prisons; literacy activities may be oriented at homeless people.

In NL, through the Fund for European Aid to the Most Deprived, FEAD, libraries provided guidance and support to lift people out of poverty and integrate most deprived people better into society.

In France, an *écrivain public* is made available in public libraries for illiterate users and facilitates them in their administrative tasks.
