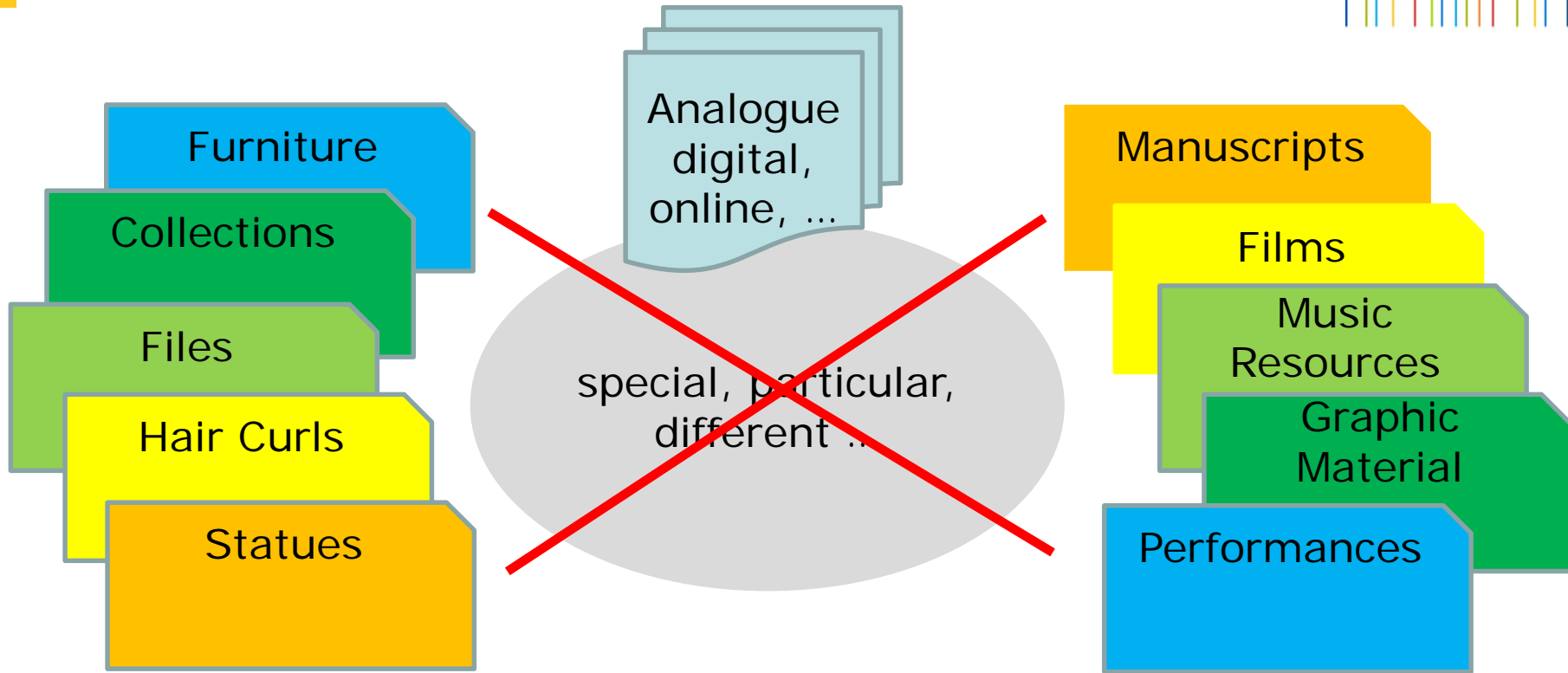

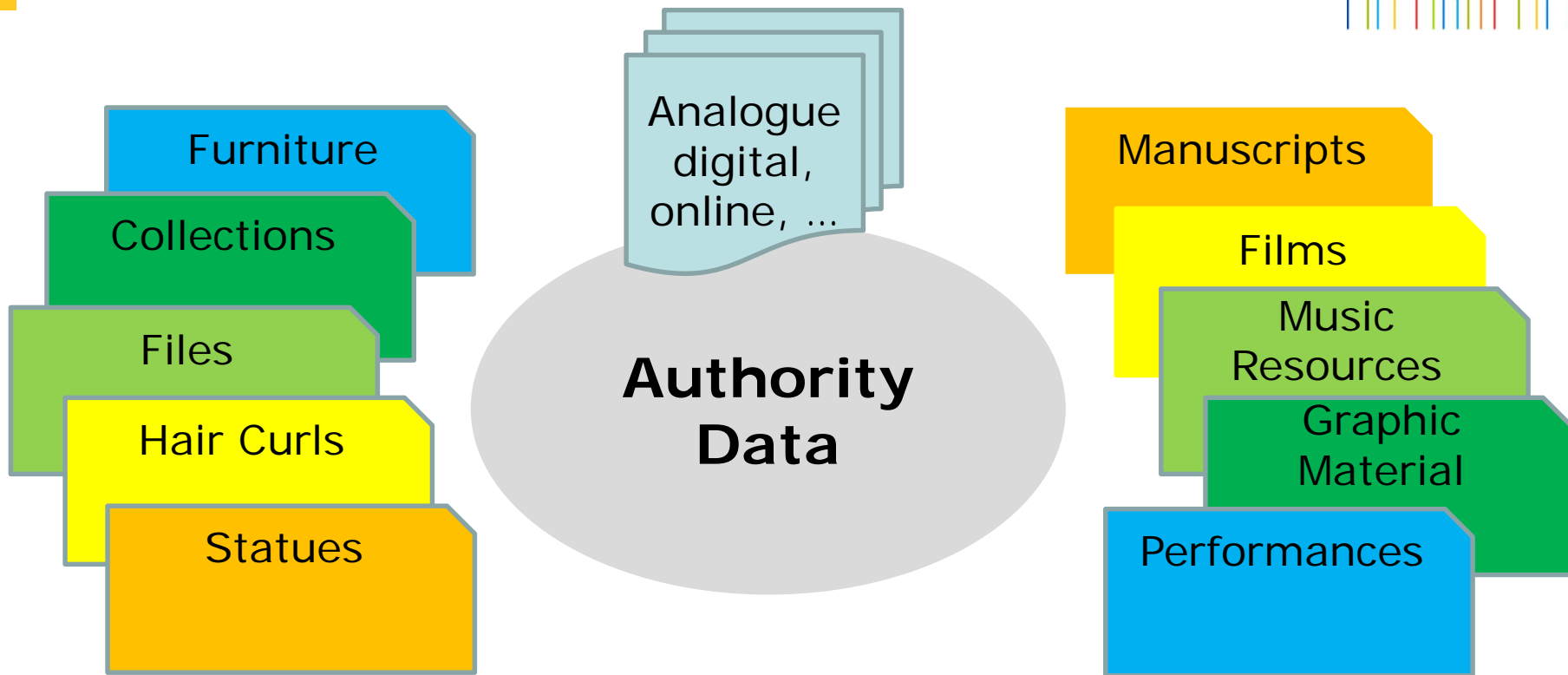

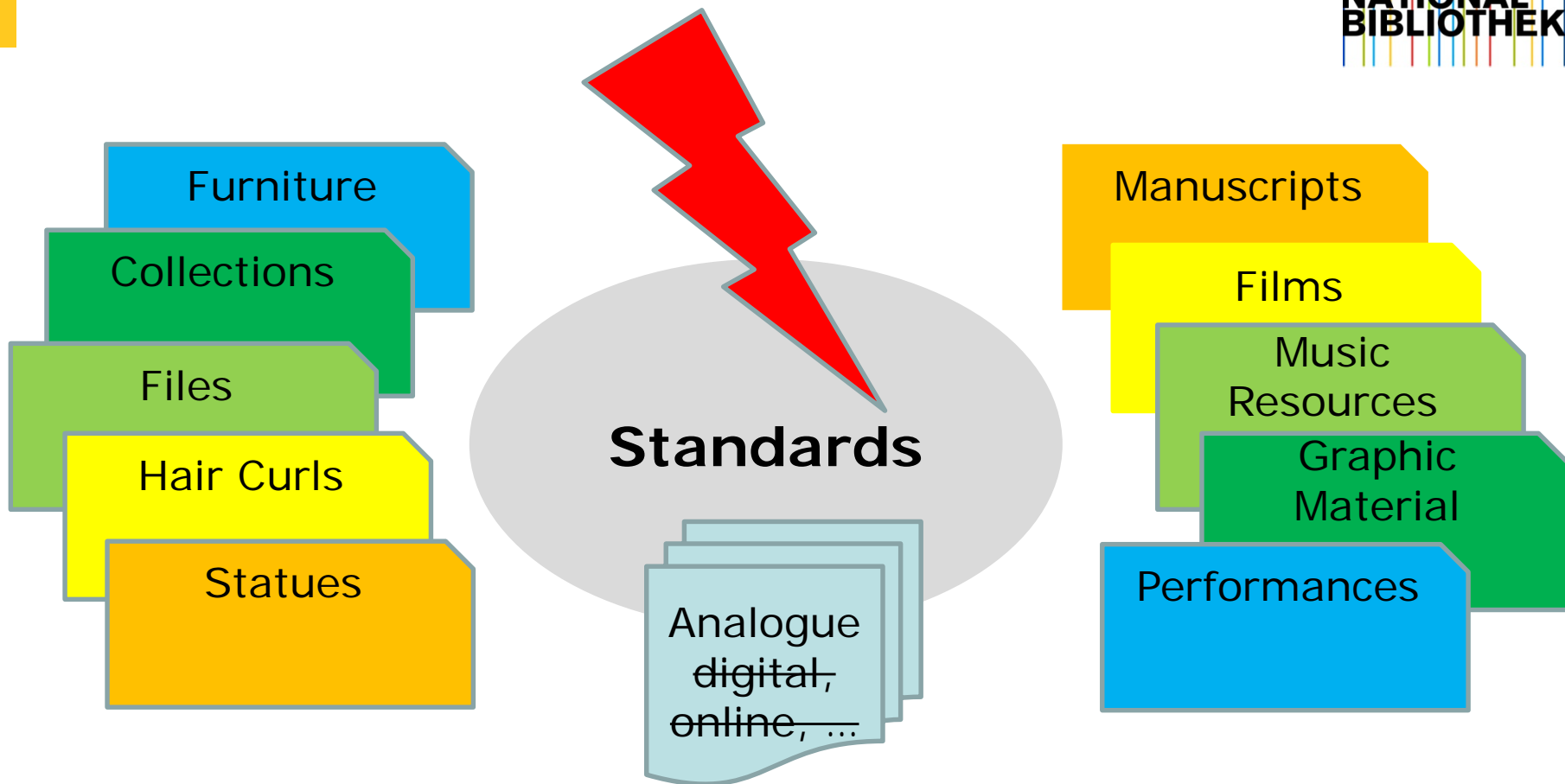

## Standards – current status

- So far, each community has its own standards.
- First attempts to harmonise them are taking place.
- Nevertheless, thinking is mainly in sections.

# Where are we going?

- Cross-disciplinary cooperation
- Identity of the collections should be preserved.
- Data should be interchangeable, at least at the core.
- The focus should be on the users.

# What is needed?

- Motivated partners
- Stable organisational structure
- Sufficient resources
- Perseverance, high frustration tolerance and patience

# What is common to these groups?

- Their material types can be found in many different cultural facilities.
- The existing regulations do not take these types of materials sufficiently into account.
- There are many "home-made" solutions.
- No capacity for complicated indexing models

# What separates these groups?

- Integrated in partly very different organizational structures.
- The range of topics is very diverse.
- Very different composition of experts

# What role does authority data play?

- Authority data are the lowest common denominator for all working groups.
- Authority data files are established tools with a stable organization.
- Most authority data files have very extensive vocabularies.
- Terminology is approved and reliable.



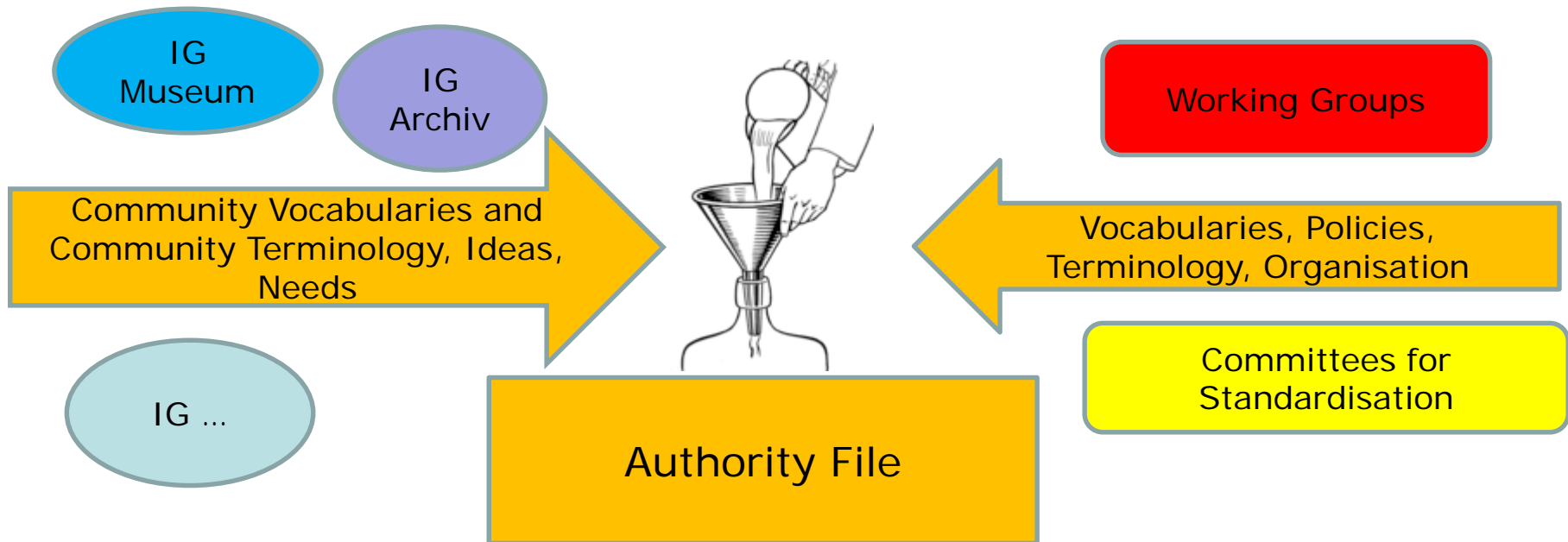
# Integrated Authority File (GND)

- The GND is a library tool developed out of the library community.
- The GND community has been working on opening the standards database for some time.
- The GND will change over the next few years to accommodate the requirements that arise from cross-disciplinary work.

# Who is involved in opening the GND?

- The Committee on Standards in DACH as the steering committee of the GND, which has already been expanded to include members from the archives sector.
- The thematic working groups in DACH
- Interest groups (archive, museum, buildings, performing arts)
